

Zion National Park

Other Southwest parks have vastness; Zion is intimate. As you walk through its narrow, winding canyons, each new turn makes you feel like the earth is unfolding before you. The classic hike here is the Watchman Trail into lower Zion Canyon.

Springdale

A lot of national park gateway towns are tourist traps, but Springdale (just outside Zion) is a charmer, sitting in the folds of red rock cliffs like an unwrapped present. Gallery hop, buy postcards to send to envious friends, and stay in a B&B.

Mt. Carmel

Nearly 70 years ago, Maynard Dixon made this corner of Utah his home.

Today, the artist's rustic studio in Mt. Carmel is open for tours. In August, it's the site of the Maynard Dixon Country festival, with exhibits by contemporary landscape artists.

Red Canyon

State 12, just east of U.S. 89, is a National Scenic Byway, and you'll see why as you enter Red Canyon, with its eerie hoodoos rising alongside the road like rock ghosts. From the Red Canyon Visitor Center, hike along the 1-mile Pink Ledges Trail, which gives you great vistas for little effort.

Bryce Canyon National Park

If Zion is considered intimate, Bryce is allencompassing—a natural amphitheater studded with pinnacles and spires, as weirdly beautiful as dripping sandcastles. If you just want to gaze at Bryce, there are turnouts that let you do that; if you have time for a hike, a moderate short

one (2.9 miles round-trip) can be made on the Queens Garden/Navajo Loop trail, which takes you into the canyon.


Escalante


Once a sleepy Mormon town, Escalante has become an adventure spot for travelers who want to explore the Grand Staircase–Escalante National Monument. This area epitomizes the Southwest at its wildest; mazes of rocks descend along Escalante River toward the Colorado River.

Boulder

Between Escalante and Boulder, Utah, State 12 climbs onto a ridge that gives sweeping views; it's one of the most beautiful drives in the country. Amid the wilderness, you come upon a great place to stay, Boulder Mountain Lodge—a sophisticated surprise with one of the best eateries in the Southwest, Hell's Backbone Grill.

St. George, Utah, is 120 miles northeast of Las Vegas via I-15. Kanab is 83 miles east of St. George on U.S. 89, and Boulder, Utah, is about 200 miles from St. George. Check on hiking and road conditions before heading out; heavy rains, typical in July and August, can cause flash floods.
